Board member Bobek requested to pull Consent Docket item 6 (f) flexibility to use textbook funds to discuss the waiver requests of Edmond, Jones, and Sequoyah Public Schools.

Board member Bobek moved to approve one-year waivers for Consent Docket item 6(a) through (e). Board member Hernandez seconded the motion.

Board members discussed concerns/needs to provide specific use of funds, and Ryan Pieper, Executive Director, Accreditation Standards, provided emails amending the school waiver applications that clarified specifics of textbook funds requested.

Board members requested for transparency, in the future, specification of fund amounts and uses will be required on all waiver applications.

The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Smith, yes, Ms. Hernandez, yes; Ms. Lepak, yes; Mr. Bobek, yes; and Superintendent Hofmeister, yes.

Board member Bobek moved to approve Consent Docket item 6(f) flexibility to use textbook funds for Edmond, Jones, and Sequoyah Public Schools to use funds exclusively for certified teacher pay per their email amending the application requests; and in the future waiver applications to include the amount being requested. Board member Smith seconded the motion. The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Smith, yes, Ms. Hernandez, yes; Ms. Lepak, yes; Mr. Bobek, yes; and Superintendent Hofmeister, yes.

LEGAL SERVICES

Update, discussion, and possible action regarding Western Heights Independent School District, and possible action to approve, modify and/or deny actions and inactions of Western Heights Public Schools Board of Education at its October 25, 2022, and November 14, 2022, meetings pursuant the terms and conditions of State Intervention and Accredited with Probation, as modified on July 12, 2021 – Approved

Travis Jett, General Council, State Board of Education, said no action was recommended on the October 25, 2022, Western Heights School Board meeting agenda. November 14, 2022, agenda items recommended for approval were 4.4, 6.1, 6.2, 6.3, 7.1,7.2 and 7.3. All relate to personnel actions, accepting resignations, hiring an aviation instructor and a contract phonemic awareness and positive behavioral intervention, monitoring and detection. Mr. Jett advised approval is within the State Board of Education (SBE) authority, affirmed by the Oklahoma Supreme Court, to provide oversight of the school district and to act due to resignation of three local board members.

Brayden Savage, Interim Superintendent, Western Heights Public Schools, said recommendation would approve 4.4 adjunct teachers, 6.1 regular financial needs, 6.2 Swiss Suite program, 6.3 Heggerty Phonemic Awareness curriculum, 7.1 through 7.3 personnel and employee call/no show.

Board member Smith moved to approve item 4.4, 6.1, 6.2, 6.3 and 7.1 through 7.3 on the Western Heights, November 14, 2022, board agenda. Board member Hernandez seconded the motion.

Board member Smith informed that at this time the school district, due to no board quorum, could not have a meeting. Governor Stitt must appoint replacements and has requested the assistance of SBE members to find candidates. The goal is to provide names to the Governor by Thanksgiving, if possible, and relying on Ms. Savage and Western Heights community to step in and provide names of candidates. Congratulations to the community, staff, and Ms. Savage, and the SBE looks forward to the placement of committed representatives.

The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Smith, yes; Ms. Hernandez, yes; Ms. Lepak, yes; Mr. Bobek, yes; and Superintendent Hofmeister, yes.

Monthly report on complaints filed, and status thereof, regarding alleged violations of 70 O.S. § 24-157 and Administrative Code Rule 210:10-1-23, prohibiting race and sex discrimination -

Brad Clark, General Counsel, State Department of Education, presented a monthly report on complaints filed, status and alleged violations of state regulations and rules of law. Five complaints were filed locally since the last update, and none resulted in a finding of non-compliance. Only one with same result was reported to the State Department of Education (SDE) legal services and was communicated to the complainant.

Harding Independence Charter District's compliance with 70 O.S. § 628.13

Mr. Clark said a student at Harding Independence Charter District submitted an inquiry regarding concurrent enrollment. Pursuant the sited state statute 70 O.S. § 628.13 requires the SBE and State Regents establish requirement for concurrent enrollment and act necessary to ensure students have all opportunities available including preparing promotional materials provided to students; and no school district shall deny a student the opportunity to participate in concurrent enrollment if the student meets the requirements. The State Regents and SBE requires a student have a signed form from the high school stating their eligibility to satisfy graduation no later than the spring of the senior year.

Ms. Clark presented the Harding policy requiring signed statement/form of eligibility no later than the spring of the junior year for concurrent enrollment; interpretation of the state statute and state Regents; SDE recommendation to amend policy and make retroactive for affected students; and denial of amending policy change.

Louis Falsetti, Attorney, representing Harding Independence Charter District, said the district's interpretation is that student did not submit the form by the junior year, signed by high school principal or counselor stating eligibility was satisfied for high school graduation. Curricular requirements of college admission require no later in the spring of the senior year with parent or legal guardian written permission. Admittedly the sentence is not grammatically correct.

Steven Stefanick, Superintendent, Harding Independence Charter District, said the reason for the policy is because it is done in the spring of the senior year which is February through June. If statements are presented in March, enrollment has passed, the student will not get into college because the school must prepare their curriculum and school assignments ahead of time. The SDE graduation requirements established 23 credits to

graduate. Harding requires 28 credits for the purpose of making sure students reach the standards for graduation requirements before leaving Harding Independence Charter.

Board members asked questions and discussed student and parent signed handbook and rules; administrative exceptions, missed/late deadlines consequences; grievance, complaint, process, and appeal procedure.

Mr. Jett advised the item was for discussion only and no action recommended. The matter may return to the December agenda as an action item.

Appeal of a transfer application upon denial 70 O.S. § 8-101.2; OAC 210:10-1-18.1 Jenks Public Schools - Denied

Mr. Clark presented a student transfer appeal denial by Jenks Public Schools due to lack of capacity consistent with the school district's capacity policy restrictions. The Jenks Public Schools and Board of Education denied the parent's student transfer application and transfer appeal. The student's parent, Maria Gabriela Morales pursuant state statute and rules, submitted an appeal to the State Board of Education.

Board members asked questions and discussed district transfer policy capacity compliance and determinations; state statute student transfer/appeal and required capacity audit; student/parent issues at Tulsa Public Schools and out of district move, transfer appeal needs; SDE assistance and resources.

Travis Jett advised capacity is the issue and Jenks followed the district capacity policy. The board would need to take action on the appeal.

Board member Smith moved to deny the appeal in support of the existing policy adopted by Jenks Public Schools. Board member Hernandez seconded the motion. The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Smith, yes; Ms. Hernandez, yes; Ms. Lepak, yes; Mr. Bobek, yes; and Superintendent Hofmeister, yes.

Board member Bobek moved to convene into Executive Session at 2:38 p.m. Board member Hernandez seconded the motion. The motion carried with the following votes: The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Smith, yes; Ms. Hernandez, yes; Ms. Lepak, yes; Mr. Bobek, yes; and Superintendent Hofmeister, yes.

Return to Open Session

Board member Bobek moved to return to Open Session at 3:16 p.m. Board member Hernandez seconded the motion. The motion carried with the following votes: The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Smith, yes; Ms. Hernandez, yes; Ms. Lepak, yes; Mr. Bobek, yes; and Superintendent Hofmeister, yes.

Superintendent Hofmeister said no decisions were made on the matters discussed in the Executive Session. Both legal counsels were present in the meeting.

Mr. Jett said on agenda item 8(a) as the litigation describes, by the District Courts which has a Supreme Court Opinion 2020 OK 56, to discuss a request for the State Auditor and Inspector conduct an audit of school districts that have received more State Aid than they were entitled in 2014. The Supreme Court case opinion was acted upon after the District Court Judge ruled there was no requirement for the defendants which include the State Board of Education and State Department of Education to seek repayment of excessive state aid payments to certain schools until an audit was performed. Key aspects of the Supreme Court ruled and confirmed that under the Oklahoma Constitution appropriations lapsed two and one-half years after they were made by the legislature (paragraph 76-77 of the litigation case). In 70 O.S. 18-118, paragraph 35, the Opinion language emphasizes the State Board of Education has an affirmative duty to make a demand on a school district for a return of excessive State Aid apportionment. On page 36 the Supreme Court Opinion states, "We do conclude the lack of an audit does not relieve the State Board of Education from requesting an audit from the State Auditor and Inspector, pursuant to 18-118, when the State Board of Education has reason to do so to fulfill it's 18-118 duty," which is the recruitment duty.

Board member Hernandez moved the State Board of Education formally request the State Auditor and Inspector conduct an audit of school districts which may have received more State Aid than entitled in 2014 as contemplated by Independent School #52 versus Hofmeister 2020 OK 56. Board member Smith seconded the motion. The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Smith, yes; Ms. Hernandez, yes; Ms. Lepak, yes; Mr. Bobek, yes; and Superintendent Hofmeister, yes.

ADJOURNMENT

Board member Smith moved to adjourn the meeting at 3:21 p.m. Board member Bobek seconded the motion. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

The next regular meeting of the State Board of Education will be held on Thursday, December 15, 2022, at 1:00 p.m. The meeting will convene at the State Department of Education-State Board Room, 2500 North Lincoln Blvd., Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
