Budget Responsibility for Common Education

“The Legislature shall establish and maintain a system of free public schools wherein all the children of the State may be educated.”

– Article 13 of the Oklahoma Constitution

The *State Board of Education* shall “...submit to the Governor..the budgetary needs of local school districts...”

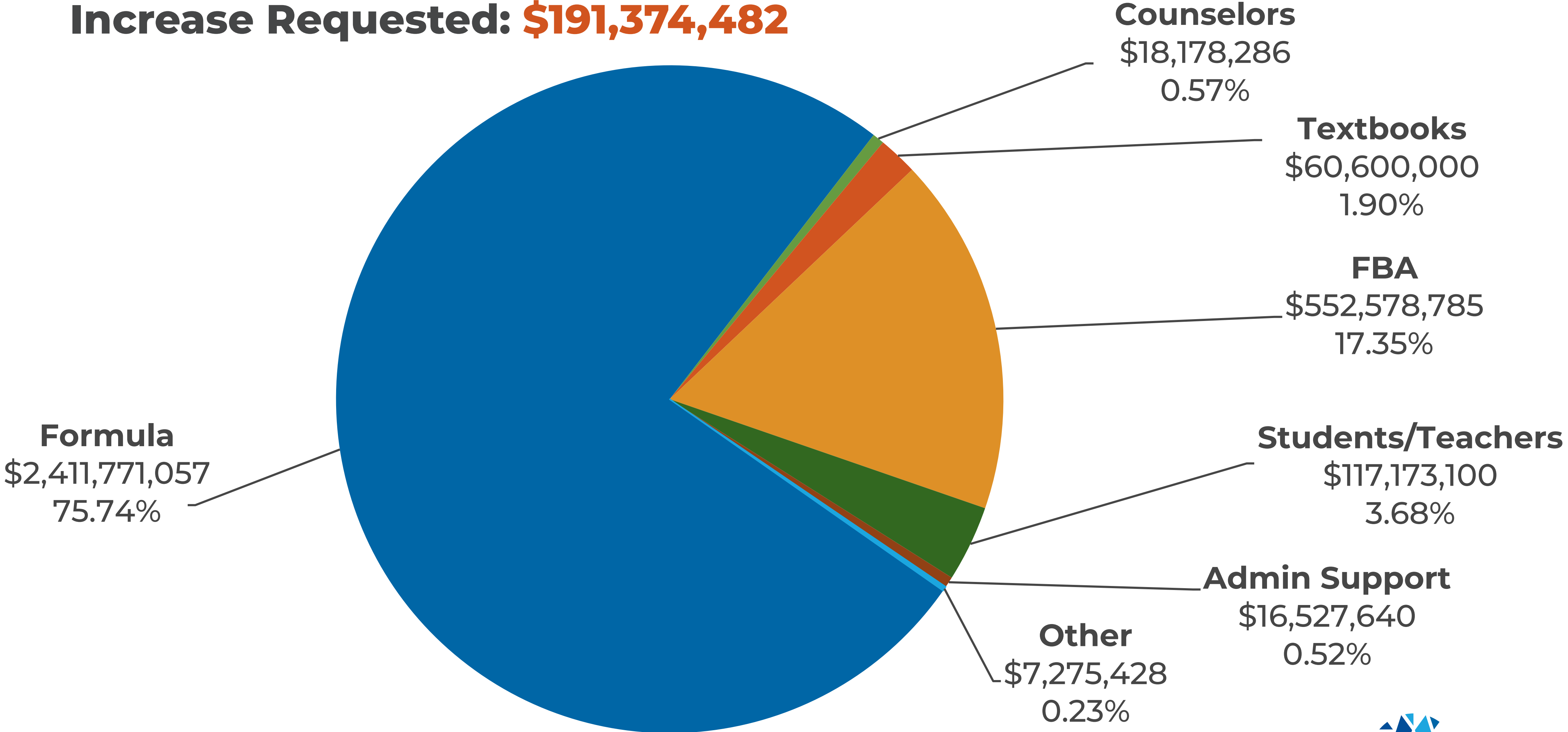
– 70 O.S. § 3-104

By 2025

- Top 10 in high school graduation
- Reduce college remediation by half
- ICAP for all students grades 6-12
- Top 20 On NAEP
- Reduce the need for emergency-certified teachers by 95%
- 75% of kids ready to read by kindergarten

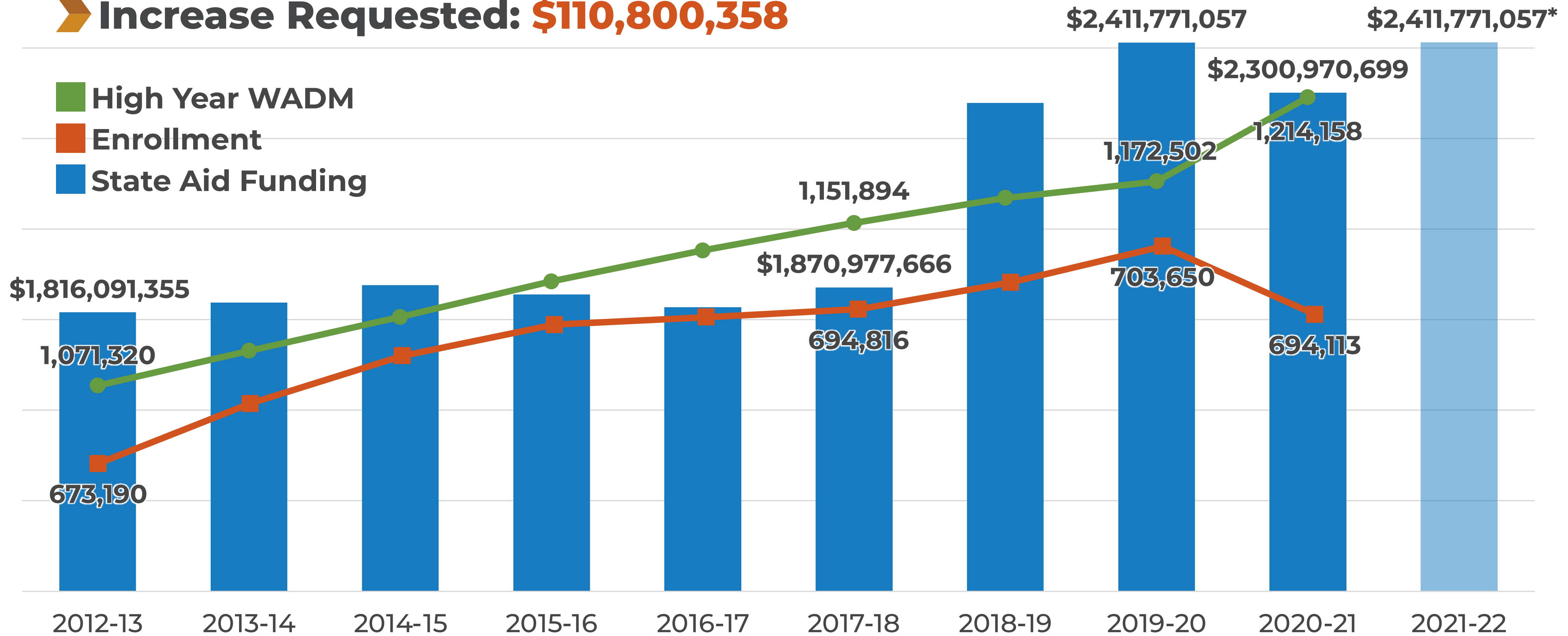

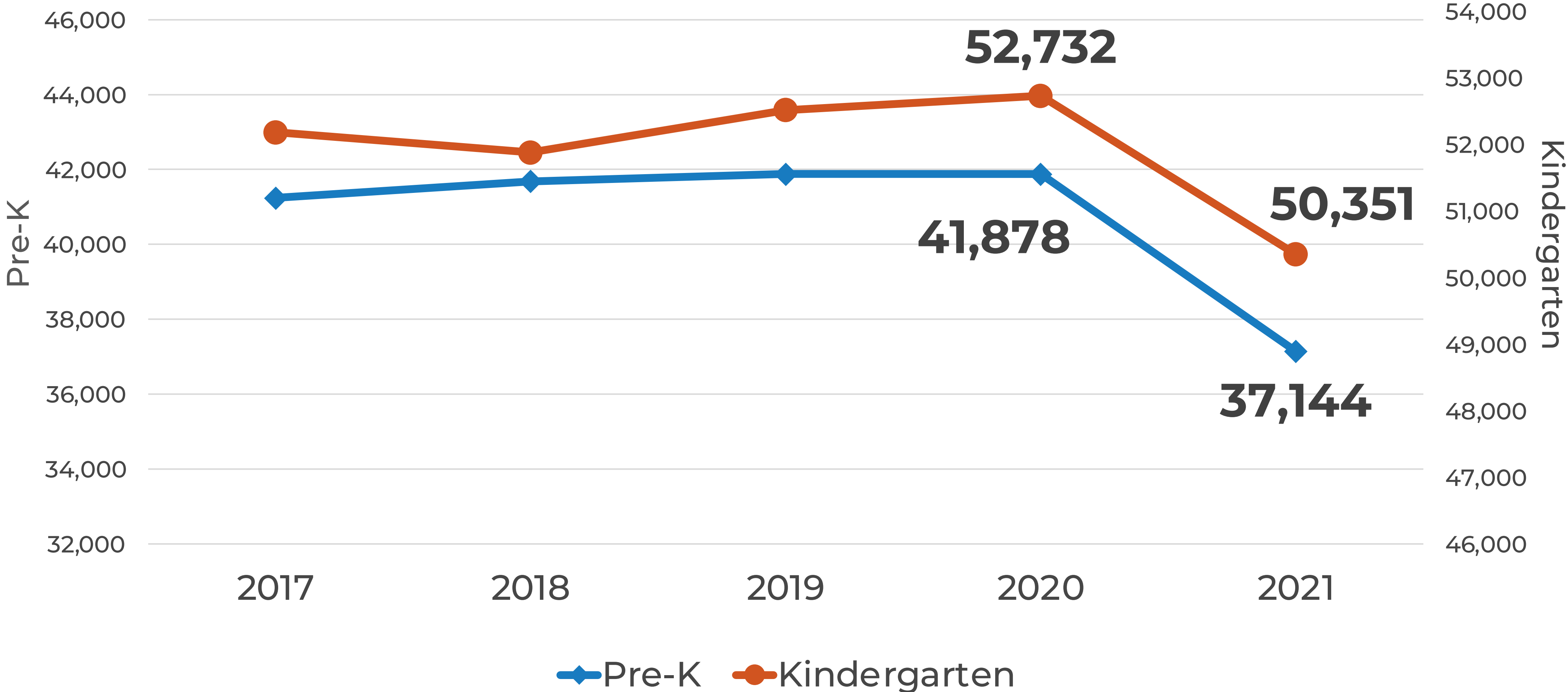
Student Population and Funding Formula Appropriation

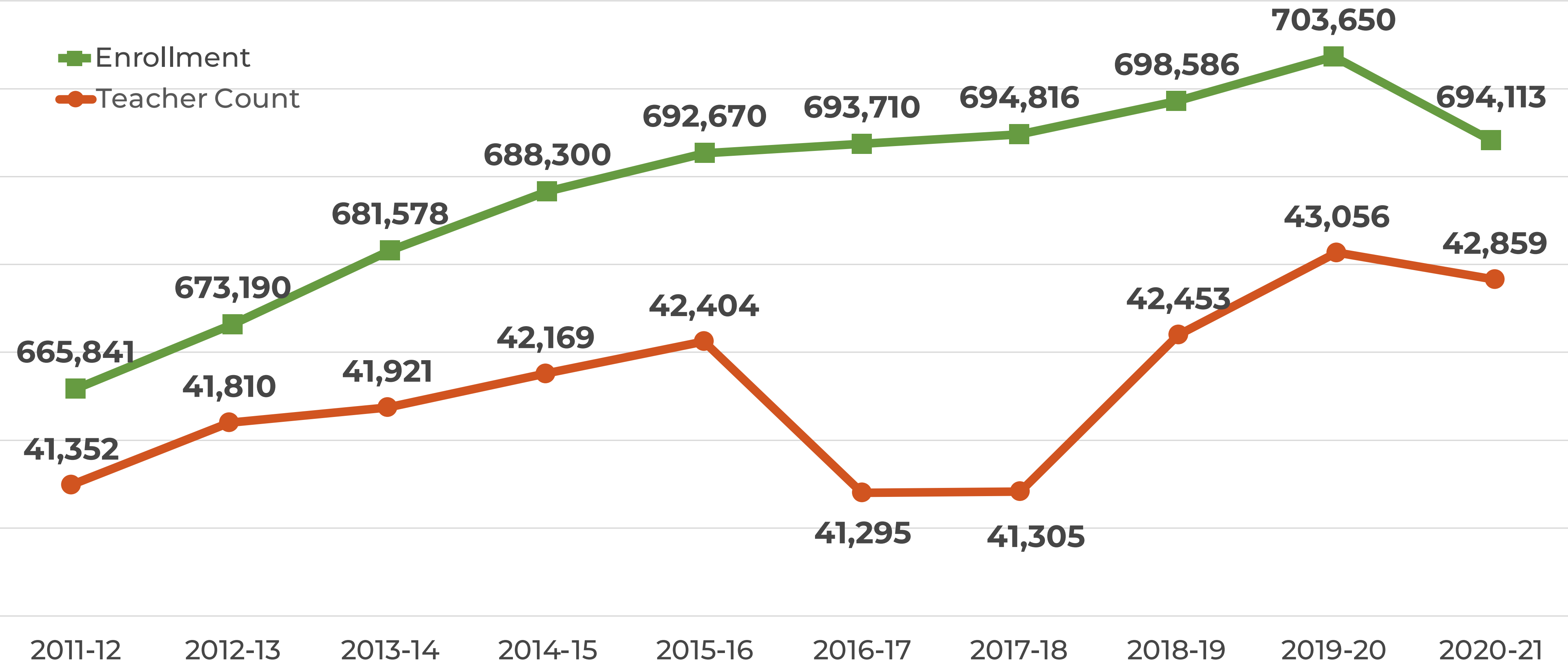

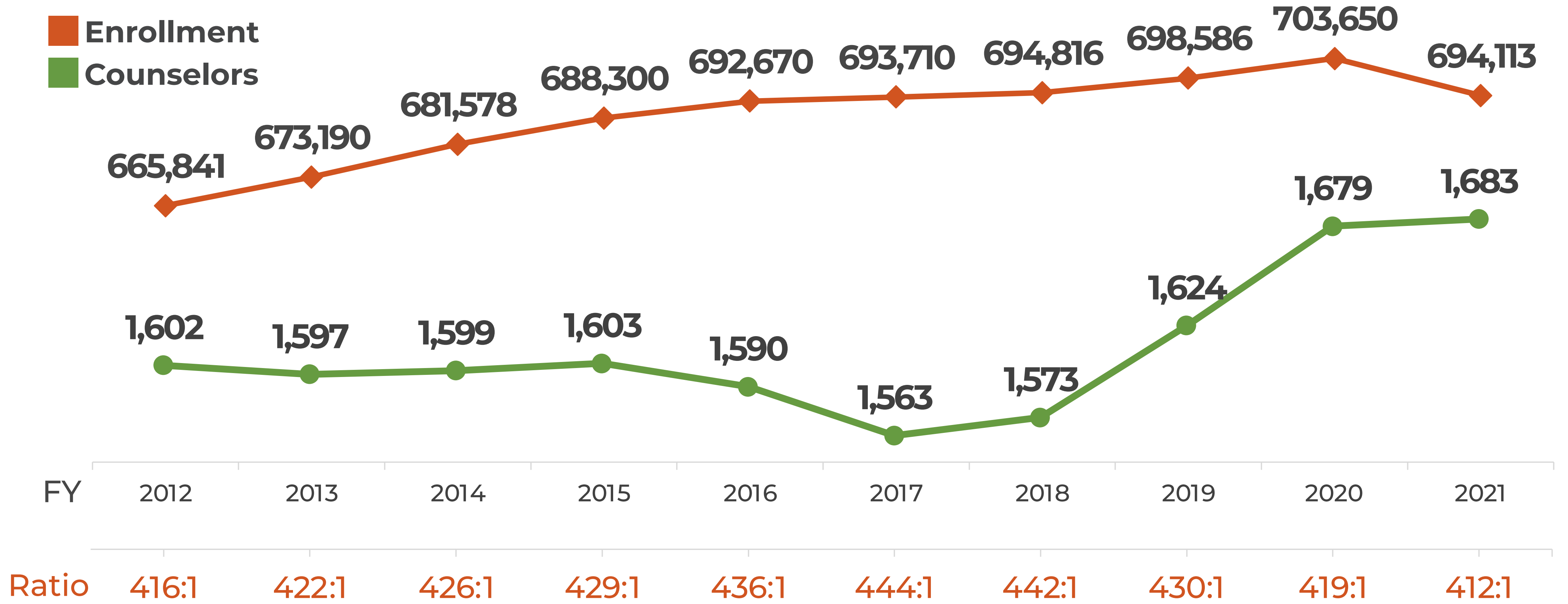
Pre-K and Kindergarten Enrollment

American School Counselor Association recommended ratio-250:1

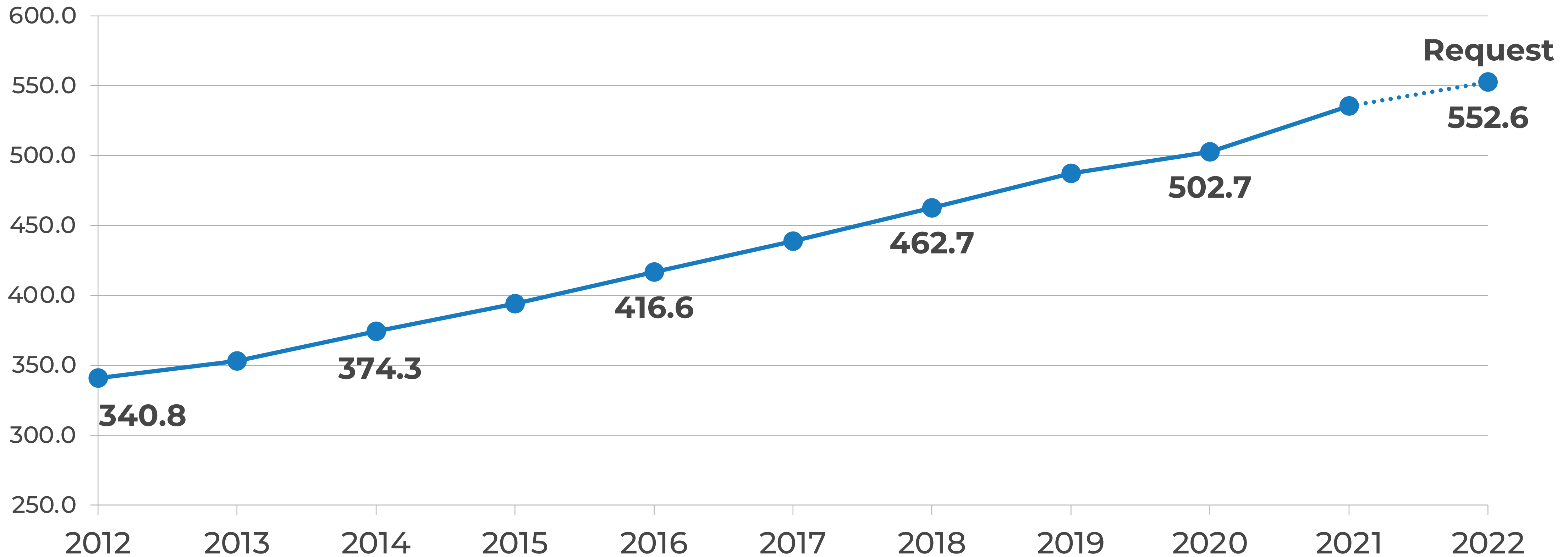

(In Millions \$)

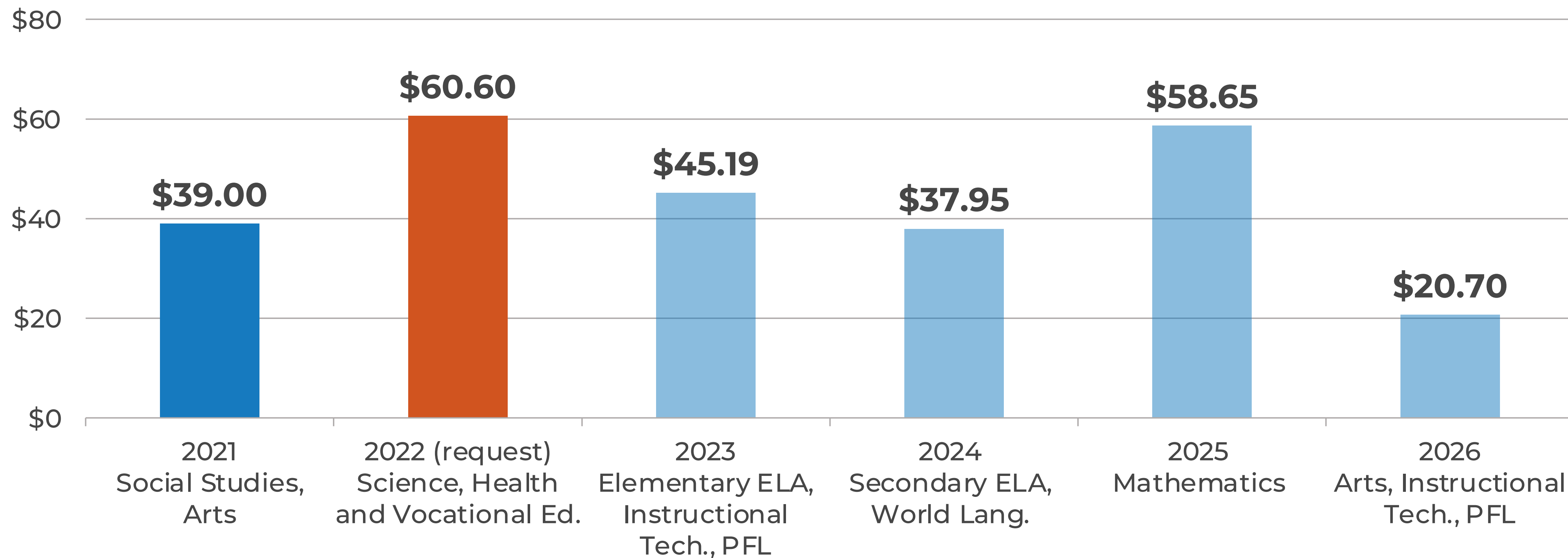

Textbook Adoption Cycle

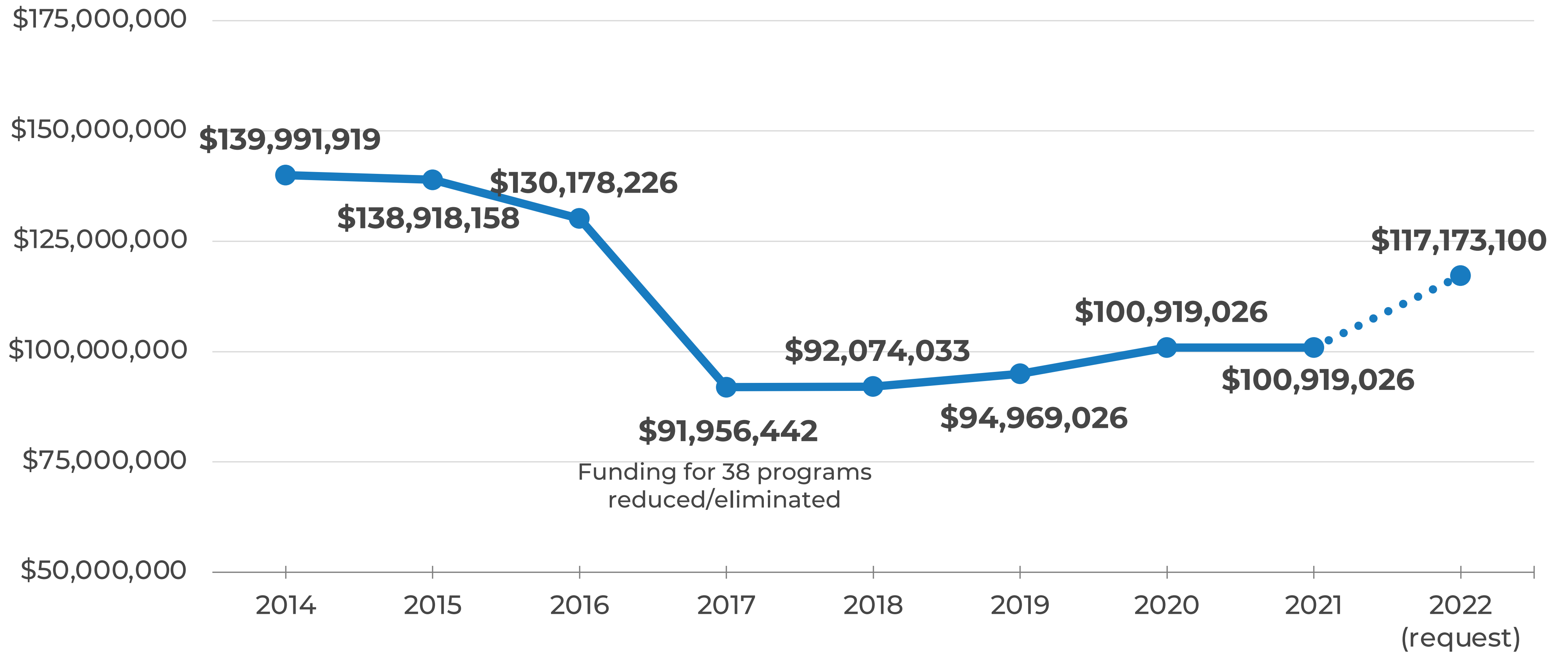
Estimated Adoption Costs

Alternative Education – At-Risk Students

“A student whose present or expected status indicates he/she might fail to complete secondary education for reasons which may include **academic deficiency, behavioral difficulties, excessive absences**, pregnancy or parenting, **family issues**, substance abuse, financial issues, **physical or mental health issues**, juvenile justice involvement, or other such factors, not including disability status.”

SoonerStart Early Intervention Outcomes 2019-2020

98.3% of families indicate that SoonerStart services have helped their child develop and learn. Children in the SoonerStart program substantially increased their rate of growth by the time they exited the program:

- **86.1%** increased growth in acquisition of knowledge and skills
- **85.0%** increased growth in social emotional skills
- **87.7%** increased growth in use of appropriate behaviors to meet their needs.

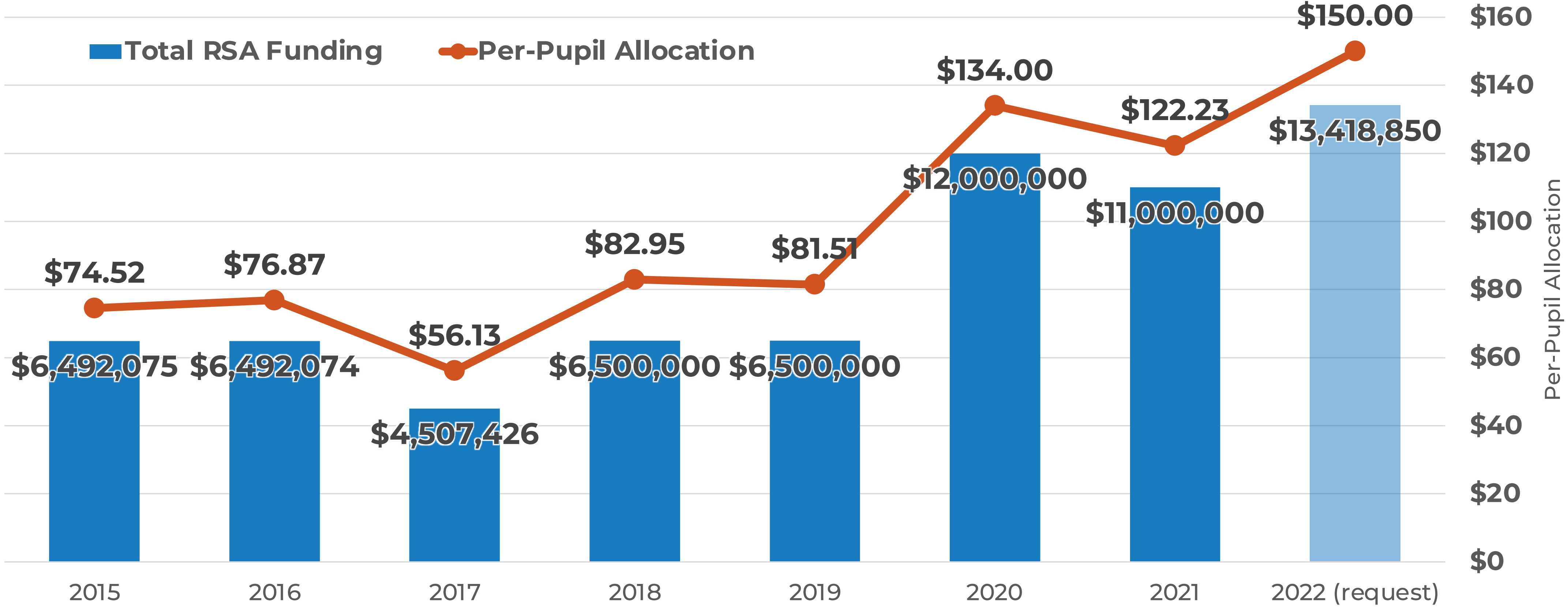

Imagination Library

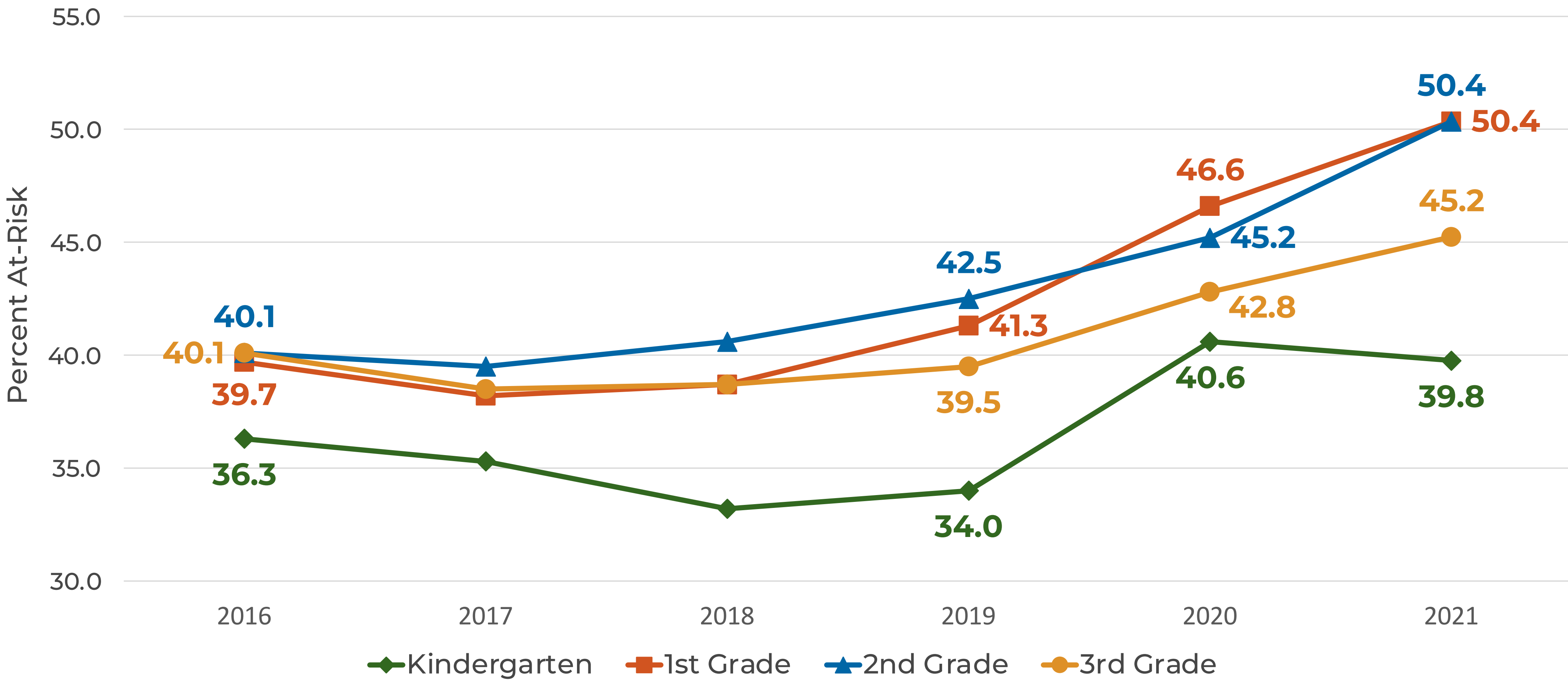
- Passed by the Legislature in 2020 per SB 1803.
- Statewide program to provide age-appropriate books to pre-school children ages birth to 5 at their homes monthly.
- OSDE is required to include an estimated need for the upcoming year in its annual budget request.
- This amount estimates a 25% participation rate for the first year and OSDE staff costs required under the legislation.

➤ **Total Investment: \$1,016,250**

Reading Sufficiency Act (RSA) Funding

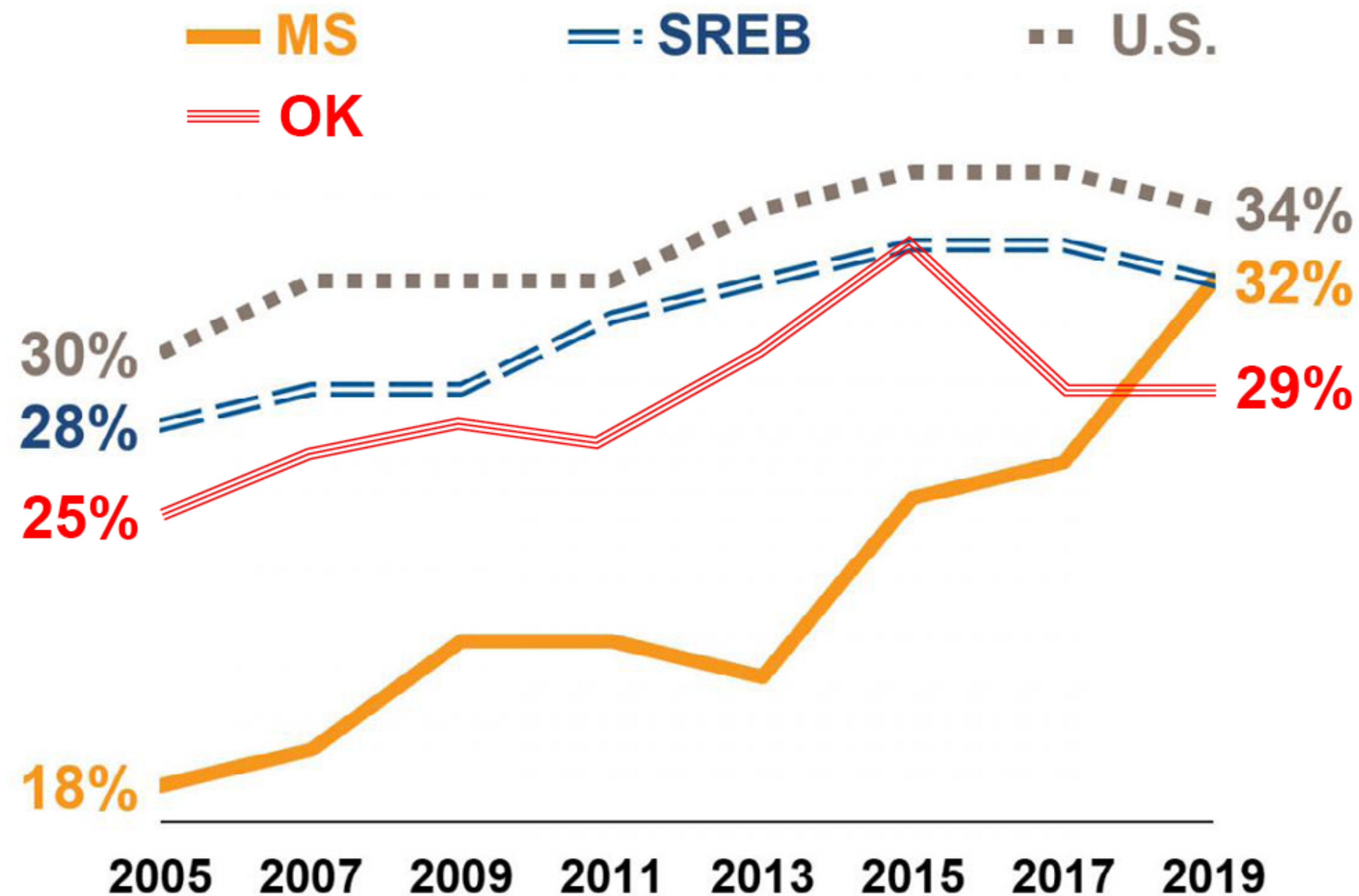


RSA – Students At-Risk at Beginning of Year

Percentage Scoring At or Above Proficient in Mississippi

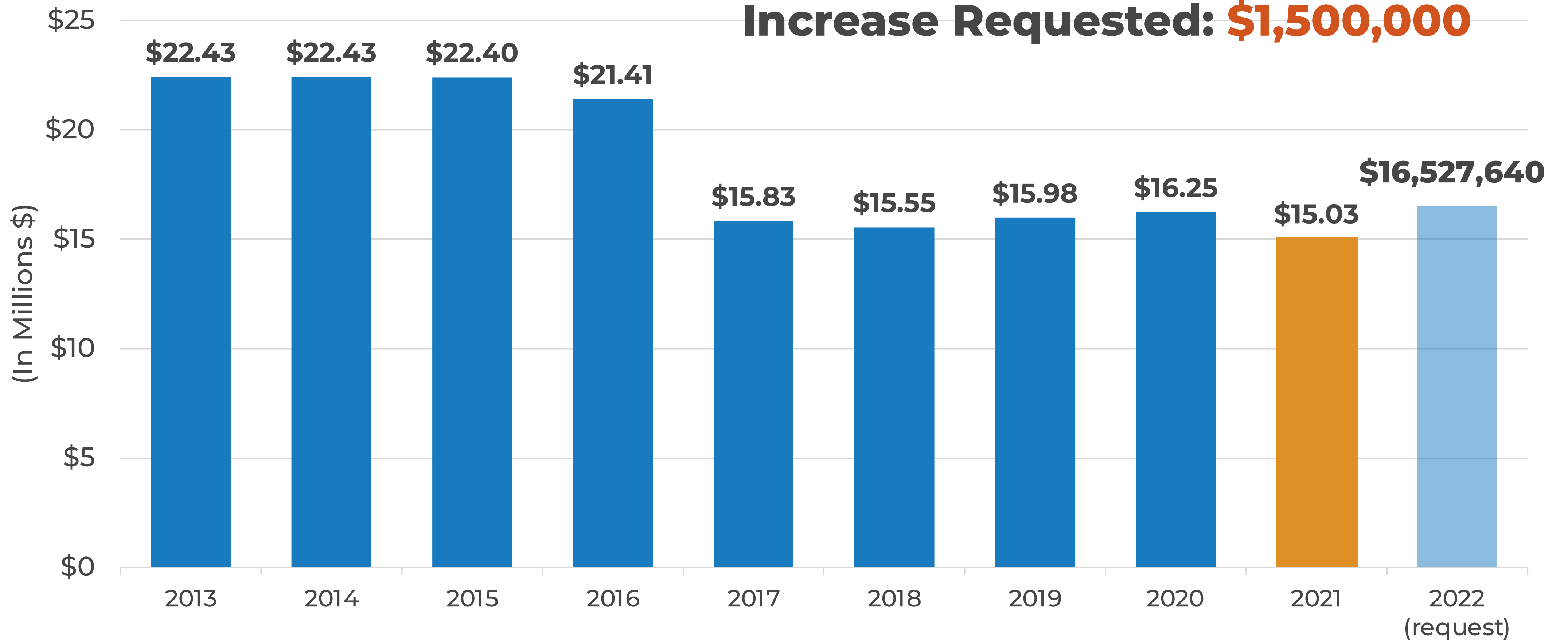
