Family engagement is not a program, activity, or event. The Oklahoma Family Engagement Framework establishes it as a shared responsibility among families, schools, and communities to build relationships that support a child's learning and growth from birth through college and career. With this pathway identified as a priority through your planning process, your next step will be to guide your team through the Do and Review steps.

DO

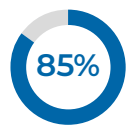
- How will you support all staff (e.g., professional development, scheduling, resources) in building their awareness, skills, abilities, and confidence to understand the importance of family engagement? How will you work with families to build trusting and meaningful relationships to support their children's learning?
- At all levels of your organization, how will your family engagement plan encourage joint decision-making, student and family voice and choice?
- How can you help families become more engaged in their children's learning so that their knowledge base grows for helping their children learn? Are families understanding "the why" behind learning assignments?
- How will your plan help families build confidence to engage in their children's learning experiences at school and at home?
- How will you identify potential challenges families may face (e.g., technology, supplies, time) and what each family has contributed or has to offer (e.g., interests, skills, strengths) in supporting their child's learning?
- What family leadership opportunities exist within your district, school, or organization? What specific efforts have focused on building their leadership skills?
- What family afterschool tribal programs exist within your district? Are you aware of any tribal community centers that have community meetings?
- What resources and tools will your team need to be successful to build leadership?

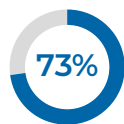
- What happened when you implemented your plan?

Pathway in Action

In *Engage Every Family: Five Simple Principles*, Dr. Constantino shares strategies to build leadership among families. He navigates the concept of “changing the questions” for family/child at-home conversations (e.g., Changing the question from, “What did you do in school today?” to a more specific question about a classroom assignment). He provides examples of how to create a transparent school/classroom by teachers sharing content information on a regular basis with families using modern-day technology applications (e.g., Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest, web pages, cell phone, email, texts, and other technology available to you). Dr. Constantino challenges you to ask, “Are you engaging the already engaged? How do you engage the disengaged?” With an emphasis on **meaningful** and **relevant**, he guides you through a series of examples to help you understand why families make decisions about whether they want to be involved or engaged in activities or trainings you have to offer families. Motivating families to become engaged is the key first step to promoting success for every student and family.
